



A radiohalo is the mark left around a particle of radio-active substance by the radiation coming from the particle. It can only form in a solid substance such as rock since in liquid or molten rock the mark would dissipate and could not be seen.

These radiohalos from PP-218 (polonium) develop their half-life in only three minutes. In other words, they emit radiation for only a few minutes, thus the radiohalos had to be in those rocks when the rocks were first brought into existence.
